Legislative leaders must persuade rank and file to vote for deal. The House will take it up Monday and the Senate as soon as Wednesday.

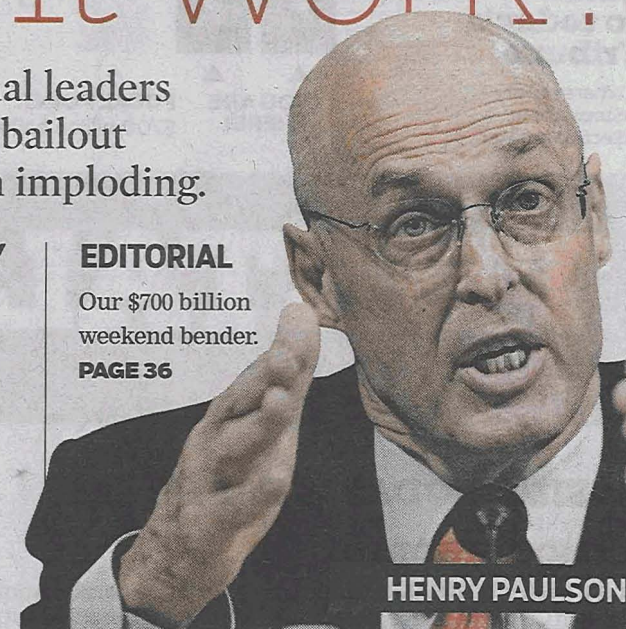

E. coli cases linked to lettuce

Restaurants and institutions should not buy iceberg lettuce distributed by Aunt Mid's Produce Co. after the produce was linked to more than 30 Illinois cases of E. coli, the Illinois Department of Public Health warned Sunday.

No Aunt Mid's lettuce should be used until further notice.

Aunt Mid's has voluntarily suspended the processing and sale of iceberg lettuce throughout the United States, according to the public health department in a written statement.

Holocaust letters purchased

An Illinois foundation has acquired a rare collection of World War II postal documents, including letters from concentration camp inmates.

The Holocaust memorial exhibit, called "The Nazi Scourge: Postal Evidence of the Holocaust and the Devastation of Europe," belonged to longtime philatelist Ken Lawrence of Pennsylvania.

The Florence and Laurence Spungen Family Foundation purchased the collection, which will be housed at the Illinois Holocaust Museum and Education Center in Skokie, which is scheduled to open next year.
